From the President – Leann

Spring is on the horizon and our thoughts are turning to planning for the final training months of this year. With weather becoming more reliable we hope the last training cancellation is behind us. If so, our last training day will be on 26th November and our annual Xmas Fun Day will be on 3rd December. We are intending this year to utilise the new barbeque area on our Fun Day.

A large shed was recently erected not far from the tap area, on the opposite side of the fence to the larger kindergarten shed. This will be used for storage of items not used frequently. Our other storage shed, on the opposite side of the clubrooms will be tidied even further, with easier access to items used weekly. Many thanks to City of Charles Sturt, for providing funding to enable purchase of this shed, and manpower to enable assembly and installation. Many thanks also to Councillor Kelly Thomas, for securing funding for this project.

Discussions are currently in progress with Council to take steps to improve the condition of the park for 2024 and beyond, resulting in less training cancellations due to ongoing damage caused by football parking. This has been a persistent problem spanning many decades. With adequate, consistent preparation during the non-football season, and increased management and surveillance of Game Day entry, exit and parking procedures, the park should remain viable for all activities - dog training, community use and football parking.

Our progress toward Force Free accreditation is steadily continuing, with class sizes continually being monitored, and tweaked in readiness. Small class sizes are non-negotiable to gain RSPCA accreditation, 8 with an Instructor and Assistant, or 6 with Instructor only. This allows more attention for each class member but relies on adequate numbers of volunteers. As always, more Instructors are required and importantly, more class assistants. If you can spare time on Sunday mornings and are interested in learning more about training and understanding dogs, please ask your Instructor for details. Fringe benefits apply.

Our Rainbow Shop and Rainbow Café continue to be popular, with dehydrated Prime 100 products now available in the shop. Prime 100 is very popular with dogs, the dehydrated version is easy and light to carry and can be stored at room temperature.

CHOOSING THE RIGHT BREED FOR YOU

A dog is a big commitment, often over many years. Choosing the most suitable breed for your ifestyle is paramount – for both you, your family and your dog. Consider all the implications, have family discussions, and do your homework before taking the next step. Search on line for information from the myriad sites available, many with checklists to make your job easier and to ensure as much as possible, that you make the best choice possible. Be patient, take your time, choose well.

Dogs are not a "throw away" commodity. Rescue facilities and private rescue organisations in South Australia are already bursting to the point of turning dogs away.

Remember too, that dogs are sentient beings – they too have feelings and understand much more than most people realise! Mental enrichment for dogs is as important as physical exercise. Dogs feel boredom, despair, joy, happiness, helplessness, depression, fear and many other "human" emotions. Mental enrichment helps alleviate their boredom and challenges them which can result in more resilient, fulfilled, happier animals.



Although we've domesticated them, their genetics remain largely the same, their desire to hunt and forage for food and think for themselves is still intact. Give them a job to do! This can help alleviate digging, barking, pulling clothes from clotheslines etc.

Choose a breed which will complement your lifestyle – active? sedentary? outdoor? indoor? water related? Affectionate? Independent?



Consider your age and exercise requirements relative to those of your dog. An older or sedentary person may not be suited to the exercise requirements of a dog from a working breed, e.g. Border Collie, Kelpie, Australian Shepherd. These types of breeds are usually also very intelligent, with a high requirement for mental enrichment as well as physical exercise. Both are equally important to maintain a fulfilling, well balanced lifestyle for your dog. Walking on leash once or twice a day, or staying in the back yard only with ball games is not adequate for these types of breeds.

Repetitive ball throwing for active dogs can become obsessive and results in a super fit dog, who continually requires more and more stronger and faster ball throwing as they become fitter and fitter, a Catch 22. This is a compulsion, with no cognitive functions being utilised.

Those with sedentary lifestyles may be more suited to a Greyhound, Cavalier King Charles, French Bulldog, or Chihuahua.

Dogs need mental enrichment – puzzle games, foraging, sniffing, music, television, fly ball, scenting, agility, dedicated Doggie YouTube Channels and Spotify playlists etc. Again, there are myriad online sites with information about these activities and many more for dogs of all ages, types and breeds.

Give some thought also to -

Coat length/Shedding –

Grooming/clipping etc. can be time consuming, inconvenient and costly. Is this a potential problem?

 Size – Small? Large? In between? Giant?
 Bear in mind medications are administered according to body weight.
 The larger the dog, the more expense with almost every trip to the Vet, potentially over many years.

Trainability/Intelligence – Some breeds are more easily trained than others, bear this in mind when choosing your breed.



Consider your home/yard size, fencing, grassed areas, availability of green spaces near your home. Some dogs live very fulfilled lives in small areas with little yard space if they have regular access to green spaces and daily walking/sniffing.

Do you want a family pet, a guard dog, a running/swimming mate, an affectionate dog or an independent dog? These should all be considerations when choosing your breed.

☑ **Consider the medical needs** of your breed over time, illnesses, ailments, inherent problems as they age.



A brief word about Genetics.

Genetics are a guide only. Be aware that personality differences between dogs of the same breed can be greater than personality differences between breeds. Related or unrelated dogs of the same breed may also be predisposed to different physical genetic problems according to which genes each individual dog inherits. Definitely consider the genetics of your breed, they are often a good indicator of what to expect, but never an absolute guarantee.

Whichever breed or dog you choose, enjoy them!!
